DISCOVERY AND USE OF LITHIUM TO TREAT BIPOLAR DISORDERS

John's Father was Dr David Duncan CADE:

General Practitioner, Murtoa 1908 – 1920

DR JOHN CADE: Born 18th January 1912 in Murtoa

- 1928 Studied medicine University of Melbourne. Qualified as a Psychiatrist. Worked as a house officer at St Vincents Hospital and then Royal Children's Hospital
- **1937** Married Jean
- **1940** Captain in Australian Army Medical Corps, AIF. Posted to 2nd 9th Field ambulance
- **1941** Served as a surgeon, Singapore
- 1941 1945 Singapore fell to Japan. Dr Cade became a POW in Changi prison
- 1948 Dr Cade discovered the effects of lithium carbonate as a mood stabilizer in the treatment of bipolar disorder, then known as Manic Depression
- **1949** Medical paper 'Lithium Salts in the treatment of psychotic excitement'. A result of experiments on guinea pigs and himself Problems of lithium toxicity reduced once suitable blood tests

Lithium being a naturally occurring chemical it could not be patented. Not seen as being commercially viable Slow adaptation – USA banned its use until 1970

- **1952 1977** Superintendent and Dean of Clinical School. Developed modern facilities and replaced authoritarian approach to patient care, such as group therapy.
- 1969 1970 Served as federal president of Royal Aust & NZ College of Psychiatry
- **1976** Officer of the Order of Australia
- **1980** Died
- 2018 Tribute Naming of CADE LANE in Murtoa. Many family members attended the ceremony
